<u>This "NO"vember Acknowledge the "NO", but Focus on the "NOW"</u> by Interim Pastor Dave Patterson

Saying "<u>NO</u>", and hearing the word "<u>NO</u>" is part of our earthly lives.

Good parents keep their children safe by exclaiming, "<u>NO</u>!".

We say "<u>NO</u>" to drugs, injustice; "<u>NO</u>" to racism, lust, to bullying; say "<u>NO</u>" to exploitation, bigotry and hatred.

Some people in the church, and other organizations say "<u>NO</u>" when they are asked to volunteer and give their time and talents, because they know their plates are too full already.

Some have heard the shattering word "<u>NO</u>", when they asked the love of their life to marry them.

- Others have heard the painful word "<u>NO</u>", when they applied to college, a job, or applied for a home mortgage loan.
- We have known special saints who instead of seeking revenge, said, "<u>NO</u>, I choose to forgive as Jesus has forgiven me".

I have known many people who said "<u>NO</u>" to continued medical treatments, and chose to enroll in palliative or hospice care.

The Bible has many instances where "<u>NO</u>" is spoken.

God told Adam and Eve "<u>NO</u>" in regards to the forbidden fruit.

Sarah and Abraham laughingly cried, "<u>NO</u> way" when they were told that in their old age they would have a child.

Moses's mother, Jochebed said "<u>NO</u>" when the Egyptian government demanded that she hand over her newborn son to be killed.

- The Ten Commandments are loving words of "<u>NO</u>" that keep us safe from sin, and empower us to live in God's grace.
- Daniel said "<u>NO</u>" when he was told to worship a false God.

THOUGHTS FROM THE PRESIDENT

Changes and transitions...this has certainly been St. John's theme for the last couple of months. While we've kind of been in limbo since Pastor Jim's retirement the end of June, we are now ready to start the actual process of moving forward! We will officially welcome our Interim, Pastor Dave Patterson, to the St. John family on November 3. And then the real work begins – starting the journey to find the permanent voice for our pulpit and leader of our congregation. Are you excited? Maybe a little nervous? That's all OK! I've talked about it before – transitions and changes are hard! Let me share one of mine with you.

Dale and I just celebrated our 40th wedding anniversary on October 20. Quite a feat, in my own opinion! And I know a lot of people in our congregation have celebrated bigger numbers than ours, so you know what I am talking about. But 40 years ago, Dale was already living in South Dakota, and I was living in Cedarburg. We had been apart for a year, as he left for the Air Force the previous October, and we had seen each other twice during that time. We got married on Saturday, left for our honeymoon on Sunday, and the following week packed up my apartment and got ready to move. Dale had picked out a house to rent in Rapid City (sight unseen for me), and off we went.

I think this move was probably the hardest transition I've ever gone through. Being a newlywed was a change all by itself, but now I was living 900 miles away from home and my family, with no friends, no job, and I had no idea where to find anything. Shortly after we got there, Dale went back to work on the base, which was about 10 miles away, and he was on alert, so he was gone for a week at a time, and it was me and the dog. And I thought, what did I get myself into? So besides having the TV schedule memorized from the time I got up until the time I went to bed, I kept on going! I learned my way around town, figured out how to navigate the base, and got a job and met people...I persevered and pressed on! Even if I didn't realize it at the time, God was certainly boosting me up and helping me every step of the way. I'm sure many of you have similar stories of your own, where you met change head on, and with God's help, succeeded as well.

There are lots of examples of change and transition in the bible that teach us about embracing them with faith. Noah's story highlights the importance of steadfast faith in the face of criticism and massive life changes, urging believers to trust God's plan even when it seems unconventional or challenging. Moses' journey from shepherd to leader of Israel illustrates the power of divine calling and the importance of stepping into new roles with courage, despite feeling unprepared or inadequate. Joseph's transition from slave to ruler in Egypt demonstrates how setbacks can become setups for greater achievements, emphasizing resilience, integrity and the belief in God's presence through every situation.

Change is hard, transitions are messy, unknowns can be scary...but we have a God who is faithful! He is with us! So let's trust Him and lean on Him during this transition.

Epic Youth Ministry Report September 2024

Confirmation Class

We started our year together with a Kick Off Cookout outside at Trinity. This night focused on fun with games, roasting hot dogs and marshmallows over a fire, and a few "get to know each other" activities.

Our confirmation class size has really grown this year! We went from 21 to 29 registered youth, and there is the possibility of another youth joining us. The family has asked about the program, but hasn't joined yet. We have had to make a few adjustments in how we conduct the classes, but it has been working out. We break into smaller groups for discussion, activities, and highs and lows. The pre-class dinners continue to be popular and several families have signed up to provide dinner. This week I extended the invitation to make dinners to other members of our congregations.

The first part of the year the class will be looking at the Apostles' Creed. In addition to looking at different parts of the Creed, we wrote a lesson on what a creed is and talked about the Apostles' Creed in general.

Because of the size of the group and one pastor teaching the "Back to Basics" each week, I have invited some parents to become involved in supervising the game room and helping with discussion.

Service Opportunities

During evaluation we talked about adding more service opportunities. As mentioned in the previous report, we had youth bake for Immanuel hosting the Ozaukee Food Alliance Dinner. I am working with churches to help with fall grounds clean up. It looks like only Advent and Faith have things scheduled at this time, but youth from all churches can participate. Youth will also have the opportunity to help with Advent's anniversary brunch. In exchange, the group will make a donation to the joint youth ministry account which could be used to offset some of the retreat cost.

Joint Children's Christmas Program

Advent, Faith, St. John, and Trinity will be working together again for a joint children's Christmas Program. The program will be held at Faith Lutheran Church on Dec. 15. The tentative time is 11:15 AM. I have met with the music director to look at program ideas.

Lísa Wegner, Youth Dírector

The EPIC confirmation program is a shared ministry of Advent, Faith, Immanuel, St. John, and Trinity Lutheran Churches. The program is directed by Lisa Wegner (lisa@adventchurch.org/414-315-3104).

Confirmation prep is for youth in grades 6-8. Topics are in a three year rotation. The classes are taught by the pastors and Lisa on a rotating basis. When youth have completed confirmation prep, they are confirmed in their home church according to the tradition of the congregation. The program is from 5:15 PM-7:15 PM with classes held at Trinity Lutheran Church, N60W6047 Columbia Rd, Cedarburg. We begin with dinner, followed by a time for fun, before beginning class at 6:00 PM. Class is a lively combination of videos, discussion, and activities. Additionally, we have some field trips and celebrations that take place elsewhere.

The November Sunday School class at St. John is scheduled for November 24. Start time is 11:00 and runs 30-45 minutes.

STEWARDSHIP CORNER

November, the beginning of the holiday season, starting with Thanksgiving. It is also the time when we emphasize stewardship in our congregation and begin to consider our pledges to the work of the church for next year. And really, it is fitting that Thanksgiving and our stewardship emphasis come together, because it is a time during which we especially give thanks for our many blessings.

Here, at St. John, I have tried to keep stewardship, with it's many facets before you and in your thinking, all year round, through the articles in the Pulsebeat.

In the article God and Money, Hall Powell, a veteran minister and expert fundraiser, shares his take on the significant role finances play in a Christian's life. The following is a portion of what he has to say and are direct quotes from his article.

The purpose of money:

The Holy Spirit, the author of the Bible, devotes twice as many verses to money (about 2,350 of them) than to faith and prayer combined.

Why would Jesus say more about money than heaven or hell? 15% of his recorded words were spent on this one subject.

- * I suggest that he wants us to understand that wealth presents a barrier to genuine spiritual birth and growth.
- * A timeless spiritual principle: There is a direct relationship between our attitude and actions concerning money and possessions.
- * Zacchaeus (Luke 19): Here and now I give half of my possessions to the poor...Jesus gauged his true spiritual condition by his willingness to part with his money.
- * The rich young ruler (Matthew 19:16) If you want to be perfect, go sell your possessions and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven ... he went away sad: Jesus gauged his spiritual condition by his unwillingness to part with his money.
- * The depth of transformation in the lives of the early church was evidenced by their willingness to share their assets to meet each others needs.

Hall Powell Asks, "Why is Money Important to God?"

Help Us Grow Spiritually:

- * Our beliefs about money are not only radically different from God's but diametrically opposed to them.
- * Our handling of money is a litmus test for our true character and an index of our spiritual lives.
- * The stewardship of our money and possessions becomes the story of our lives.
- * Isn't it interesting that in the account of the poor widow (Mark 12:42- 44) that Jesus watched the people putting money into the temple treasury? He was interested enough in what was going on to use it as an object lesson for His disciples.
- * Our money is God's business. Why?
- * Can we truly say that we have died to self, taken up our crosses, putting Jesus first in our lives with no apparent effect on what we do with our money and possessions?
- * We are told to give Him the first fruits for the work of the Kingdom; we are promised if we do that, He will bless us abundantly (Mal.3)

STEWARDSHIP CORNER, cont.

Two Kingdoms: Heaven & Earth: - He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose. Jim Elliot

- * Matthew 6: 19-24 (read). In this discourse, Jesus tells us the proper relationship to money and possessions.
- * Luke 12: 13-21 The parable of the rich fool: This is how it will be with anyone who stores up things for himself but is not rich towards God.
- * Jesus is appealing to what we do value: temporary earthly treasure in order to make an analogy about what we should value: eternal heavenly treasure.
- * When money is spent on earthly treasures, it is ultimately consumed, stolen, wears out, or is destroyed.
- * But when money is spent on heavenly treasures: God, His Word, and people, the results change drastically: we pay it forward.
- * Earthly treasures don't last. Heavenly ones do. Earthly treasures leave us one way or another: they are either lost or we die and leave them behind.
- * Jesus promises that those who sacrifice on earth will receive 100 times as much in heaven (Matt. 19:29).
- * Jesus Himself is our ultimate treasure, heaven is next, and our treasures are last.
- * Who are you living for? What place are you living for? What treasures are you living for?

Testimony

Randy Alcorn in his book The Treasure Principle, says this: "When it comes to giving, churches operate under a 'don't ask, don't tell policy.' We lack communication, accountability, and modeling. it is as if we have an unspoken agreement: 'I won't talk about it if you won't,' so we can go right on living as we are. Think about it. How does a young Christian in the church learn to give? Where can he or she go to see what giving looks like in the life of a believer captivated by Christ?"

- * What a testimony, especially in these days, to tell of God's faithfulness.
- * God owns everything, we are his money managers.

How To Give:

Remember that the Bible tells us that the tithe belongs to the Lord (Lev.27:30).

- * We first give to God.
- * The act of giving is a vivid reminder that our life is all about God, and not about us.
- * We should give generously, regularly, sacrificially, cheerfully, worship fully, and with excellence: 2 Cor.8:7 See that you also excel in the grace of giving.
- * We give because God first gave to us. giving is worship as much as singing or praying.

Conclusion:

- 1. What are you holding onto that is robbing you of present joy and future rewards?
- 2. Are you treating God as the Lord of your assets or only as a financial consultant to Whom you give a tip from time to time?
- **3.** Has money become your idol?
- **4.** Can you trust God to meet all of your needs, or should you hold back just in case He doesn't come through?
- 5. Five minutes after I die, what will I wish that I had given away while I had the opportunity?
